During the winter months your current Board along with some energetic help from this year's nominees list put together a year 2000 program that promises to be progressive and fun for all.

Our racing program should appeal to everyone. Whether it be intense One Design, PHRF handicap, around the islands, or a fun run to a specific destination, the Race Committee has planned a series of events that should appeal to everyone's fancy. When combined with the Winnepesaukee Yacht Club's fine program, we can expect a full season of sailing fun.

Our expanded Youth Sailing program promises to bring the enjoyment of sailing to an even broader range of youngsters. We will hold classes in Meredith and possibly Wolfeboro as well as having our program at Smith Cove in Gilford. Daily coordination of the program will be handled by Meg Heckman who is returning for another season will handle daily coordination of the program. Having her as a full time administrator will free up our instructors to instruct. Recruitment of a lead instructor and two additional USSA trained instructors is underway. We hope to introduce "two person" sailing dinghies to the program at some point during the season. These boats will help us teach team concepts and should retain the older kids in the program a bit longer.

LWSA Plans Charitable Donation Campaign to Support and Expand Youth Sailing Program

The major portion of our membership funds and proceeds from our various sailing events go to support our Youth Sailing Program. We have made every effort to keep registration fees as low as possible and to offer scholarships to those with need, the balance of the costs being covered through the generosity and support of many sailing enthusiasts like you.

Over the next few years, we plan to expand our program in many ways: More students, more boats, more teaching locations, more scholarships, more advanced programs, adult age groups. Our ultimate goal is to make sailing available to the community at large.

During the month of May we will carry out a major fund raising campaign to generate a capital fund that will support this expansionary vision. We will reach

out to all our members, past and present, for their support. We plan to solicit support from WYC members, from the general sailing public of the region, and from the parents of kids that have benefited from the program in years past. We will target some specific corporate and business sponsorship in the hope of forming a long range involvement and financial commitment. If successful, we should have the funds to expand the program with more professional coordination, an improved fleet of boats, and with the possibility of a new, more amenable location to run our programs.

Look for the mailing in May and consider making a tax-deductible gift. Also look for a publicity release in the local newspapers. We will keep you informed as to the progress of this campaign in future issues of the Broad Reach.

Spring Party and Annual Meeting

May 6, 2000

The Lake Winnepesaukee Sailing Association, Inc. will hold its Annual Meeting and election of officers on Saturday, May 6, in conjunction with a "SAIL 2000 Party" at The William Tell Restaurant on Route 11 in Alton, NH. (See Announcement on back page).

The agenda will be brief and will include a Treasurer's Report, election of Officers for 2000, a report on the Youth Sailing School, and an amendment to the By Laws to include a Conflict of Interest Policy.

Our speaker will be Kristin Ellison, an editor who spent 10 months aboard the 180' Barque *Picton Castle* sailing around the world. Her articles about the trip have appeared in *Soundings*.

The Tall Ship *Picton Castle* returned from an 19-month, 47-port, 22-country, 37,000-mile world cruise that crossed the Caribbean, Pacific, Indian, and Atlantic Oceans in June of this past year. The ship is once again seeking voyagers. The 180-foot, three-masted, square-rigged barque faced its world-circling adventure with a crew composed of equal numbers of men and women. These sailors face the same exhilarating challenges together whether learning celestial navigation, standing watch, furling sails, repairing rigging or hoisting anchor.

The prime mission of this sailing ship

is deep-ocean voyaging and sail training. An ASTA (American Sail Training Association) member, its professional sailors are constantly providing instruction in navigation, seamanship, sail making, and related marine arts. Not surprising, the goal of most amateur sailors is to come away with an able-bodied seaman certificate.

The Barque *Picton Castle* was completely overhauled and outfitted for this tropical ocean voyage as a training ship in Lunenburg, Nova Scotia, during a 2 million dollar refit in 1996-97. The ship is registered in Avatiu, Rarotonga Cook Islands.

Kristin Ellison, deck hand on the first world voyage 1997-1999, will be speaking about the *Picton Castle's* first voyage and her experiences aboard this traditional ship. Kristin grew up sailing with her family out of Mystic, CT and participated in the Newport-Bermuda race when she was 15 years old. It was not until this voyage that she returned to sea at the age of 29. She left her job as an illustrated book editor for Little, Brown and Company to set sail for 19 months. She now resides in Norwich, Vermont where she is a graphic designer.

Save Saturday evening, May 6 at 7 PM for a celebration of the new year and a chance to renew sailing friendships.

Why should you consider the donation of your Boat to the LWSA?

The Federal Government recognizes that gifts to religious, education, charitable, scientific, and literary organizations have contributed significantly to the welfare of our nation and our tax laws encourage such giving. You are entitled to take a charitable contribution deduction, subject to certain conditions and limitations, on your income tax return for genuine gifts of cash or property to qualified organizations. The LWSA is such an organization.

Personal property, such as your boat, that is donated to a charity is tax deductible for its full value if the property's use is related to the charity's exempt function. LWSA would use your boat for our stated boating purposes. The gift's value would help underwrite the cost of teaching sailing to young people, and help them attend regional and national competitions. Participation in training programs furthers the sport that we all share together. All the funds that we receive are invested in our program that teaches children from 8 to 16 to learn to sail and enjoy our lake in an environmentally friendly way.

Some examples of support derived from funds to our Youth Sailing Program are:

Boat Purchases - Funds are used for the purchase of junior training boats and maintenance of our existing fleet.

Support - of youth participation in men's and women's regional and Olympic sailing events

Scholarships - for students of our program who cannot afford the full tuition.

The mechanics of a boat contribution are relatively simple. We have a complete package of documents and explanations. The owner signs the title and/or registration on the back of the docu-

mentation where the word Seller appears and signs a Deed of Gift. The LWSA has the experience in handling boat contributions and can assist with paperwork preparation. Generally, if your boat's donation value exceeds \$5,000, you will need to obtain a qualified appraisal and attach IRS Form 8283, "Qualified Appraisal Summary", to your tax return. LWSA strongly recommends that any boat owner considering a contribution to consult their tax advisor.

This program has been in use at numerous other sailing organizations over the country for a number of years. We have been able to review material on the program provided to us through our affiliation with the Northeast Sailing Association and US Sailing. LWSA can realize a significant source of funds to support our sailing program and you the donor can be relieved of the considerable expense of continued boat ownership, the hassle of storing and selling the boat, realize a tax saving deduction, and, above all, make a real contribution toward our mutual goal of supporting our sport of sailing. A pamphlet containing information about the donation of your boat to the LWSA is available. A publicity campaign is also planned to solicit the general public for boat donations.

We can utilize boats of all sizes and can even handle power boats. We have recently accepted donations of a Sunfish sailing dinghy as well as a Capri 25 keelboat. We welcome your contribution.
