Our sailing calendar is underway. The Michelob Cup, held on Memorial Day weekend, saw an increase in participation over recent years. In particular we had a great showing of sixteen cruising boats. One Design racing on Thursday nights is providing some great competition among the J80 fleet. The WYC is sponsoring their PHRF race on Friday nights. 23rd Annual Michelob "Race for the Ribbon" Kicks off Season!

The long running (23rd year), reverse start Michelob Cup Race again this year provided a great way to start our season. Although the wind conditions these last few years have been wanting, interest and participation in this event continues to thrive. Entrants registering totaled 40, with some 15 catamarans joining in with 9 in racing, and 16 in the cruising division. Four boats took advantage of the "Delay Time Bonus" and received a one minute reduction in their starting delay time by sponsoring a first time ever entrant. We all look forward to seeing these new boats at our future events. Thanks Terry Pratt for a great idea. It worked.

It did not seem to matter (at least at the race's finish) who had the "delay time bonus". The fickle wind fostered lead changes each time the fleet reconverged. You would pass someone only to find them three boatlengths ahead of you on the next crossing. You were a master sailor if you were able to keep your boat moving at all times. Having taken some three hours to sail from Welch Island down to a port rounding of Diamond Island, only a few managed to drift about halfway to Middle Ground over the next hour. At this point race committee passed through the fleet and finished each boat in place.

Congratulations go to the Carrolls who sailed their J29 C'est La Vie to first place in cruising class. Evan Sideris, new owner of the J27, Force Five, and his brother Steve decided at the last moment to enter the racing class when they took on walk-on crew Tom Sullivan and his nephew Gavin. They then proceeded to find a better breeze by skirting along the Gilford shore on down to Diamond Island and were in a commanding first place position when the race was terminated. Evan is a graduate of the Youth Sailing Program. It is great to see young people like him coming back to be part of our sailing community.

Terry Pratt was honored at the awards presentation with the reception of an engraved pewter plate recognizing his long-standing service as Race Officer for this annual event.

The Racing Rules - an Introduction

Purpose

Safety

Fundamental **Rule 1** says that a boat or competitor shall give all possible help to any person or vessel in danger.

Fair Contest

Fundamental **Rule 2** says that a boat and her owner shall compete in compliance with recognized principles of sportsmanship and fair play.

Governing Authorities

ISAF International Sailing Federation

Revises the rules every four years after the Olympic Games.

US Sailing

Adds Prescriptions for United States and publishes the ISAF rules with US Sailing prescriptions.

Your Class Association, PHRF Handicap Rating

Sets Measurement rules and other rules restricting various actions while sailing **Notice of Race**

Typical for an organized regatta **Sailing Instructions**

LWSA has sailing instruction for Lake Events

Notices to Competitors

Used to amend the above after publishing

Enforcement

Competitors in the sport of sailing are governed by a body of rules that they are expected to follow and enforce. A fundamental principle of sportsmanship is that when competitors break a rule they will promptly take a penalty or retire.

Protest

Should only be necessary when both parties legitimately believe they have not infringed a rule. Formal protest written and submitted and hearing by a jury discovers the facts and decides if a rule has been infringed.

Rulebooks

Basic Rulebook: "1997-2000 Racing Rules of sailing"

The Basic Rules

This section is copied from Dave Perry's "Understanding the Racing Rules of Sailing"

These are simplified summaries of the basic rules that apply when you and another boat are about to hit. When one boat has the "right of way," that means that the other boat is required to "keep clear;" in other words to stay out of the way of the right-of-way boat.

- 1. If you are on **opposite** tacks (booms on different sides), the boat on starboard tack has right of way over the boat on port tack (just as at a four-way stop, the car on the right gets to go first). (Rule 10.)
- 2. If you are on the **same** tack (booms on the same sides), the leeward boat has the right of way over the windward boat; and a boat coming up from behind can't hit the boat ahead (just as on the road). (Rules 11 and 12.)
- 3. If you are **tacking**, you have to stay out of the way of a boat sailing in a straight line (just as you cannot pull out onto a road immediately in front of a car driving down the road). (Rule 13.)
- 4. Before most races, the race committee will give each competitor a copy of the sailing instructions (SI's), which will contain the specific information on how the races will be run. Included in the SI's will be the timing system for the starts. If not, ask someone on the race committee to explain their system. There will be an imaginary line between two marks called the "starting line." You must be completely behind this line at your start. If you are not, simply turn back and get behind the line. However, while you are returning, you must stay clear of all boats that started correctly. (Rule 20.)
- 5. Anytime you have right of way, you can turn toward another boat; but you must be sure the other boat has **time** and **space** to get out of your way. That's why windward boats must be very careful when they pass close by to leeward boats. (Rule 16.)
- 6. When you are two boatlengths from a mark or obstruction, you have to give any boat between you and the mark or obstruction room to pass it. (Rule 18.)
- 7. One large exception to number 6 (above) is at the starting marks, where you do **not** have to give windward/inside boats room to pass between you and the starting mark. If the windward/inside boat tries to squeeze in between you and a starting mark (like a race committee boat), they are "barging," which is definitely illegal (but unfortunately very common). (Rules 11 and 18.)
- 8. You must avoid all collisions if possible.,(Rule 14.)
- 9. If you make a right of way boat **change their course** to avoid hitting you, you must take a penalty. Normally the penalty is to simply get away from the other boats immediately and make two circles (called a "720"). When you're done, get back in the race. (Rule 44.)
- 10. If you touch any mark, the penalty is just one circle. (Rule 31.)

Cruisers, Racers Join the Wolfeboro Ice Cream Run

When: Saturday, June 24th Instructions:

Calculate your start time delay using the equation,

Start Time Delay (seconds) = 8. 5 (300 – PHRF rating) An example: PHRF rating of 150, Start Time Delay = 1275 sec. (21min-15sec) Don't know your PHRF rating? Call Dan Saliga 603 755-2600 for your rating.

- Leave marker #26 (between Lockes Is. and Belknap Point) to port at your starting time which will be 12 Noon plus your Start Time Delay. For the example above, the starting time is 21 minutes and 15 seconds after 12 Noon. Its that easy! You're on your best Scout's honor.
- Sail to Wolfeboro. The finish will be in Wolfeboro Bay. Look for the LWSA Wellcraft Committee Boat and a Pin.

Upon finishing you will be directed by our Docking Master to proceed either to the Town Docks or to an anchorage. A boat shuttle will be available. Monitor VHF Channel 72 for directions. Shuttle service will be available for about two hours so that you can enjoy Wolfeboro. There will be prizes awarded on the town docks. Participants can proceed home at their own schedule.

Youth Sailing Update

by Meg Heckman, YS Coordinator The LWSA Youth Sailing School boasts many changes for summer 2000 including new staff, new boats, and a very active junior race team.

Both Meg and Jim Heckman will be returning to the LWSA this year. Meg has been hired as the program coordinator and head race coach and Jim is returning to his role as an instructor. Laconia native and program alumni Stuart Johnson has accepted the assistant instructor position. Completing the senior staff is newcomer Blake Treadwell. Blake, a sophomore OT major at UNH, hails from Rochester, NY and has logged many, many hours crewing in FJs and 420's with the Wildcat sailing team. She is also a certified lifeguard and has taught both swimming and skiing.

Blake's double-handed experience will come in handy this year with the six 420's the association has purchased for the youth program. These dinghies were acquired from Brown University. 420's are 14-foot sloops used in collegiate and club racing across the country. They are sturdy, fast boats that are fun in all conditions. The new fleet will expose students to jib trim and skipper/crew communication, as well as provide new challenges for all levels of sailors.

In addition to the four senior staff members, the program is fortunate enough to have a host of enthusiastic, capable junior instructors. These JIs are graduates of the program ranging in age from 13-16. They are active racers with a desire to help younger kids and learn more about the sport of sailing. Many have their own Lasers and most race throughout the summer, both on and off the lake.

We have high hopes for the youth sailing program this summer and, as always, welcome any and all volunteers.

Invitation: The Winnipesaukee Yacht Club is once again pleased to invite all sailors to the 2000 Commodore's Cup Regatta.

Entry: Each entry must be submitted on the Official Form (a photocopy or fax copy will be accepted). The entry fee is \$40 (\$35 for USSA members) (1 - 2 person boats is \$15 - \$12.50 for USSA members) payable by cash or check made out to Winnipesaukee Yacht Club

Site: Racing will take place on Lake Winnipesaukee in either of the following locations:

A. The area known as "The Broads"

B. The area known as "Sanders Bay" Boats: Each fleet shall consist of no less than three boats.

coordinator for the Youth Sailing Program. A one-week youth sailing school session will be held in Meredith this summer. The Steering Committee is looking into ways to expand the program to other locations and formulating long-range plans for the program.
