Much of the last month's attention has gone into the purchase, delivery, and commissioning of our new fleet of Club 420s for the Youth Sailing Program. The excitement is running high with our school staff and among the kids. See the feature article and photos of our new fleet in this issue.

The overall expense for bringing in the 420s will run about \$15000. We are hoping that we will not have to seek a loan to cover the project. The Charitable Donation Program is targeted to provide \$10000 and proceeds from the sale of some of the boats donated to the LWSA the remainder. I'm pleased to *(continued on Page 2)* 



## Club 420 Fleet Is a Great Boost for our Youth Sailing Program

(Excerpts from Vanguard 420 Literature) The Club 420 is the ideal double-handed sailboat for our junior racing program and will provide the starting point for our young sailors who are interested in high performance sailing, college sailing or just having fun. It should also provide a means to couple up adults and youngsters for sailing together, to give adult lessons, and to utilize the boats as part of our long-range plan to get sailing out to the community at large.

As a junior racing boat the Club 420 provides young sailors with an opportunity to experience all levels of one-design sailing. There are more than 1700 boats being actively sailed around the country with another 500 Club 420s in schools and colleges. The U S Sailing/ Rolex Junior Championship, Junior Olympic Nationals, and the Ida Lewis Championships are held in Club 420s.

The Club 420s straightforward fiberglass construction makes repair jobs easy. Heavy duty rigging, a straight mast, external halyards, rail protectors, and bow bumpers make our Club 420s simple to maintain. See the Club 420 specifications and outline drawing in the included figure. It is very simple to add or remove trapeze and spinnaker gear. The boat is easily transportable. Four people can easily lift a Club 420 onto the roof of a van or car. We have purchased lightweight launching carts to transport the boats in and out of the water and around the boat yard. The boats are stored on the dolly carts fully rigged making it very simple for the kids to use.

## How Will the Club 420 Meet Our Sailing Program Goals?

**Safety:** The Club 420 is a self-rescuing double-handed dinghy, which can be righted by two junior sailors without the aid of a motor boat. Positive flotation within tanks and the proper use of personal flotation devices will keep the kids afloat in case of a capsize.

Learning: The Club 420 is an instructional tool, because it can be simply rigged and will introduce young sailors to all the basic sail controls without overwhelming them. The boat is virtually bullet proof when abused by a beginning sailor. The Club 420 is also a responsive sailboat that our junior sailors will enjoy sailing. In the 13 to 16 year range many beginners are turned off of sailing because traditional beginner boats like the Optimist are too small for their body size. Adolescents who have begun to grow will enjoy learning to sail in a boat like the Club 420 because it fits their body size.

Fun and Enjoyable: The Club 420 is a responsive sailboat that our junior sailors will enjoy sailing. In situations that require extra moral support the Club 420 can hold several younger sailors or an instructor and some students. It can also provide intermediate sailors with a greater challenge in the form of trapeze and spinnaker equipment. The Club 420 is a very adaptable addition to our sailing program and will provide new opportunities for junior sailors to enjoy the sport of sailing.

Fleet Racing and Advanced Sailing: The Club 420 will provide our young sailors the chance to become active in one-design sail-



boat racing. There is an active regatta schedule in our New England area that sails Club 420s. Most high school and collegiate programs use Club 420s.

## Mid Season Youth Sailing Program Update

A record number of youth sailors are enjoying various aspects of the sport this summer at the LWSA Youth Sailing Camp. With the addition of six Club 420s more kids than ever before have had the opportunity to explore sailing in a variety of ways. During the first half of the summer 38 beginners have received instruction in both the Optimist prams and the new 420s. A total of 73 slots were filled in the first five weeks of the season. We expect to have filled all 126 available slots by the ninth and final week.

In addition to the usual tacking, gybing, and docking drills the kids have participated in dryland activities such as compass navigation, ice cream scavenger hunts, and code flag bingo. One class even made model boats out of peanut butter playdough! After creating fruit leather sails and pretzel stick rigs, the children had to name and describe their sticky creations. The beginners aren't having all the fun, though. By using charts and compasses, the intermediate sailors navigated their fleet to a secret "lagoon" off the Forties, where they rafted up for lunch and swimming.

The acquisition of the 420s has also contributed to a renewed interest in the junior racing team. The Wednesday night one-design races have boasted fleets as large as 12 Lasers and the juniors love mixing it up in the new sloops. On Thursday July 6, four 420s competed in the club Bemis (youth doublehanded) run off. Twelve races were sailed in a steady 20 knots of breeze. After several hours of neck-in-neck tacking and covering, Jonathan Ewing and Katie McMenaman emerged as the club champions, a mere one point ahead of the second place boat manned by Stu Johnson and Chris Wilson. The club victory entitled Ewing and McMenaman to travel to the Lake Champlain Yacht Club to compete in the Bemis Western Regionals. Despite their lack of spinnaker experience, the pair managed to squeak out a win in the last race of the series and finished

third over all. Congratulations to Jonathon and Katie and to all the juniors for a job well done.

The next few weeks will prove to busy ones for the both the lesson program and the junior club. The racers will be sailing Lasers, 420s, and Optimists in the WYC Commodores Cup and putting their skills to the test at several more youth regattas around the region. The young athletes also hope to travel to Kingston, Ontario at the end of August for the CORK Youth Fest, an international youth clinic and regatta. Sailors involved in the lesson program can look forward to an introduction to the J-80 fleet and some possible interclub events with other local sailing programs.
