LWSA Youth Sailing Program Prospers

We are looking forward to another successful year with the Youth Sailing School. The program has grown significantly in recent years. This year's operating budget will reach \$ 33,000 with some 150 young sailors expected to experience the fun of learning to sail. This is no small task that we undertake.

For the 2002 season we have replaced the outboard motor on the 18-foot Wellcraft safety boat with a modern four-stroke 80-hp Yamaha engine. There will be two new Optimist Prams, bringing our total fleet up to 22 boats (Lasers, Club 420s, and Optimists). There are plans, with the cooperation of Merrill Fay and Fay's Boat Yard, to "paper and paint" the class room area. The Winnipesaukee Yacht Club will once again graciously provide their Yacht Yard area as a launching and storage area for the boats. There will also be improvements to the launch ramps at the site.

We have taken the suggestion of numerous parents and added a paid adult Program Director to the roster. Ken Darsney, a local schoolteacher living in Laconia, will head up our program this year. Ken will bring a new level of quality to our school through his presence on a day to day basis. Ken's credentials include not only his classroom work as a math and science teacher but also his work as a Youth Soccer coach, ski instructor, and Little League coach.

Our lead instructor for the summer season will be Matt Hickman. He has just finished his second year at USF, the University of South Florida – St Petersburg. Matt is co-captain of the up and coming USF sailing team where they compete in 420s and FJs. He will be assisted by a returning group of local instructors who all have several years of experience with our program as students, junior assistants, and most recently as instructors last year. Matt will also be the racing coach for our Wednesday night Junior Program as well as our home and away regattas. We have a good group of juniors who are anxiously waiting to improve their racing skills and go out and compete at several regional regattas including the WYC's Commodore's Cup and the Western New England Regional Midget Championships in Optimists right here on our lake on August 10.

for 2002. In addition to the annual Michelob Cup, Jimmy Fund, Commodore's Cup, and Labor Day events, we are considering adding an



event in Wolfeboro Bay, having another Night Owl evening race, forming multiple boat teams and holding an on the water rally race, and getting those remaining 30 foot plus boats from back in the eighties back out on the lake for an old timers race. The major focus is to get more boats out on the water.

We are pleased to report that we have purchased a 32-foot Chris Craft Sea Skiff to replace the Witch Way. This new committee boat is in pristine condition, has twin 327 inboard engines and a hard top pilot's cabin with a stand up head. We are outfitting the boat with our race equipment and plan to have it available for all the lake events this coming season. It is most important that race management be outfitted with a committee boat that is amenable to their ability to do their job effectively. We think this new boat will be a big plus. We need to raise \$3000 to cover the purchase price and commissioning. Take a moment and write a check (make it out to "LWSA") and mail it to PO Box 7047, Gilford, NH 03247 to help us pay for this wonderful new asset. The Sailing Instructions are essentially identical with last year's SIs. You can download a copy of the official 2002 SIs on our web site at www.lwsa.org. Copies should also be available at most events throughout the season.

Following up on the suggestions from many of the racers, the Race Committee will make much more frequent use of VHF radio to assist in carrying out racing sequences on the water. Although the use of radio transmissions does not replace the official use of flags and sounds, we want to make the racing experience as comfortable and friendly as possible. The use of radio broadcasts is becoming quite common at some of the most prestigious events around the world, Key West Race Week and the National Offshore One Design (NOOD) to name two.

Be sure to include your e-mail address on your 2002 registration form. You can also send it in to robtk@worldpath.net . Get onto the e-mail distribution list so that you will receive updates as to events, special instructions, and other important racing information.

No Hassle Racing - An Idea

On many occasions one or more of our racers have had difficulty registering and attending the skipper's meeting for an event. Whether it is the inconvenience of bringing your boat to the event headquarters or getting there in your automobile and then back to your boat to make the starting area on time, the pre-race hassle can keep you off the racecourse. In an effort to end the "pre-race hassle", we will try out a pre-race day registration/ no skipper's meeting concept at some of this year's events.

For an event designated a "No Hassle" race, just read the Notice of Race as published on the web page (www.lwsa.org) or through the receipt of an e-mail notice. To get on the e-mail list, send your e-mail address to robtk@worldpath.net. Let the Race Chairman for the event know of your intention to race and show up out on the water at the designated race area on race day. The Race Committee will work out the details and post the important items you need to know on the RC boat notice boards.

Boats can come directly from their home location and meet on the racecourse. After the event, boats then conveniently return home without having to find a way to tie up at Fay's Boat Yard, the WYC docks, or wherever the event's headquarters might be. Skippers and crew can then all meet later at the designated social gathering place to exchange post race talk and bragging rights.

If we have a "No Hassle" designated event, come out and see how easy it can be.

Invitation: The Winnipesaukee Yacht Club is pleased to invite all sailors to the 2002 Friday Night Series.

Eligibility: The regatta is open to any skipper or owner who wishes to participate. Participants must meet all regatta requirements and must have paid all event fees before becoming official competitors.

Rules: This regatta will be governed by the 2001-2004 Racing Rules of Sailing (RROS) including US Sailing Prescriptions, this notice (except as modified by the Sailing Instructions), and the Sailing Instructions.

Scoring: The Low Point Scoring System (Appendix A2) will be used.

Notice of Race - Sunday May 26, 2002 25th ANNUAL MICHELOB CUP "Race for the Ribbon"

- 1. Organizing Authority: LWSA
- 2. Rules: The race will be governed by the Racing Rules of Sailing 2001-2004, the prescriptions of US Sailing, the rules of PHRF New England for monohulls, the corresponding class rules for catamarans, and the sailing instructions as modified by this notice of race and verbally at the skipper's meeting.
- 3. Entries: The regatta is open to any boat which qualifies under the forementioned rules. Registration is between 0900 and 1100 on May 26, 2002 at Fay's Boatyard. Each entry must be submitted on the form for the race at sign up. The entry fee for keelboats is \$40 by cash or check payable to NH Distributors (includes T-Shirts for crew up to 4). Catamaran fee is \$20 per boat (includes 2 T-Shirts). This is a charity event with the proceeds to benefit the LWSA Youth Sailing Program.
- **4. Sailing Instructions:** The 2002 Combined LWSA/WYC sailing instructions shall be used and will be available at registration.
- **5. Course:** The race will be an island race as described in the Sailing Instructions. The course will be announced at the skipper's meeting.

- 6. The Start: This is a "reverse start" event. Boats are handicaped at the skipper's meeting and issued individual "delay times" based on the course length and PHRF (monohull) or Sullivan/portsmouth (catamaran) handicap factor. After the starting signal, individual boats will start after their "delay time" has elapsed.

 7. Bonus "Delay Time": Any Boat that sponsors a skipper and their boat that has never participated in this race before shall be
- their boat that has never participated in this race before shall be granted a one minute reduction in their "Delay Time" start. The new participant shall also receive a one minute reduction from their "Delay Time" start.

Why should you consider the Tax Deductible Donation of your Boat to the LWSA?

The Federal Government recognizes that gifts to religious, education, charitable, scientific, and literary organizations have contributed significantly to the welfare of our nation and our tax laws encourage such giving. You are entitled to take a charitable contribution deduction, subject to certain conditions and limitations, on your income tax return for genuine gifts of cash or property to qualified organizations. The LWSA is such an organization.

Personal property, such as your boat, that is donated to a charity is tax deductible for its full value if the property's use is related to the charity's exempt function. LWSA would use your boat for our stated boating purposes. The gift's value would help underwrite the cost of teaching sailing to young people, and help them attend regional and national competitions. Participation in training programs furthers the sport that we all share together. All the funds that we receive are invested in our program that teaches children from 8 to 16 to learn to sail and enjoy our lake in an environmentally friendly way.

Some examples of support derived from funds to our Youth Sailing Program are:

Boat Purchases - Funds are used for the purchase of junior training boats and maintenance of our existing fleet.

Support - of youth participation in men's and women's regional and Olympic sailing events

Scholarships - for students of our program who cannot afford the full tuition.

The mechanics of a boat contribution are relatively simple. We have a com-

plete package of documents and explanations. The owner signs the title and/ or registration on the back of the documentation where the word Seller appears and signs a Deed of Gift. The LWSA has the experience in handling boat contributions and can assist with paperwork preparation. Generally, if your boat's donation value exceeds \$5,000, you will need to obtain a qualified appraisal and attach IRS Form 8283, "Qualified Appraisal Summary", to your tax return. LWSA strongly recommends that any boat owner considering a contribution to consult their tax advisor

This program has been in use at numerous other sailing organizations over the country for a number of years. We have been able to review material on the program provided to us through our affiliation with the Northeast Sailing Association and US Sailing, LWSA can realize a significant source of funds to support our sailing program and you the donor can be relieved of the considerable expense of continued boat ownership, the hassle of storing and selling the boat, realize a tax saving deduction, and, above all, make a real contribution toward our mutual goal of supporting our sport of sailing. A pamphlet containing information about the donation of your boat to the LWSA is available. A publicity campaign is also planned to solicit the general public for boat donations.

We can utilize boats of all sizes and can even handle power boats. We have recently accepted donations from a Sunfish sailing dinghy to an O'Day 27 keelboat and even a Four Winns power boat. We welcome your contribution.
