The new committee boat purchased late last year is ready to serve and assist in the promotion of adult racing on the lake. The 32 ft. Chris Craft Sea Skiff is the answer to or further growth and organization of the adult racing program. During the spring a dedicated volunteer Steve Coneys spent many weekday and weekend hours retrofitting and tuning this vessel for our benefit. The enhancements included engine service and tuning, independent fuel filters for each engine, new batteries, and wringing out of the electrical system. At the culmination of these tasks Steve had the stainless steel triatic (frame for the racing flags and boards to hang from) retrofitted to the new boat as well as the installation of the associated racing hardware. The on the water race committee will have a new VHF radio with a remote full control microphone at the stern of the boat to sight and call the line. All the above was accomplished not only with Steve's labor but also with the most generous contributions of numerous LWSA friends and members. This boat is ready to serve all racers, cruisers, and those folks who will show up for the first time this year.

25th Annual Michelob Cup Report

The 25th Annual Michelob Cup "Race for the Ribbon" proved to be a good kick-off to the racing season. We had 15 monohulls (does a tri-maran count as one or three?) and 18 catamarans cover the course down to Rattlesnake Island, over to Middle Ground Shoals and then back to the finish off of Welch Island's Marker #47. The catamarans started off of Ellacoya State Park beach and sailed up to and passed through the starting line on their way around the course. With winds running between 5 and 10 knots, the participants really experienced three races inside the one race. First was the close reach down to the inside of Rattlesnake Island off of the Alton shoreline. It did not matter whether the boats sailed north or south of Diamond Island as the best way to get to the "Dead Zone" off of Rattlesnake. Once arrived there each boat could barely maintain headway as the following boats caught up along side only to fill the area with most boats in close proximity of each other. As each boat was able to squeak out from the backside of Rattlesnake it became a crapshoot as to which way to go to best make progress toward Middle Ground Shoals. The boats to have started earliest were able to maintain their lead around Middle Ground and were greeted with a freshening southwest breeze for a fast "third race segment" back to the finish.


