

register early and just show up at the starting area on race day.

- 2) The LWSA Regatta will replace the Labor Day weekend regatta. The regatta will be held the weekend before Labor Day weekend in hopes that more racers will be free from holiday related commitments and can come out and participate. The regatta will be two days with buoy racing on Saturday followed by an island race on Sunday. There will be a social gathering on Saturday evening as part of the overall weekend's activities.
- 3) The annual Frying Pan Race, double handed boats going twice around Welch Island, will remain in its historic place as a Friday evening race on Labor Day weekend.
- 4) There will be several dates where an Open Format Race will be held. These Saturday afternoon events are to be low level, no hassle format, with no registration fees. Each of these dates may have a race of very different format from the prior and so on. It is probable that one of the races will be another Old Timer's Big Boats like the very successful event from last year. The Committee Boat will go out, set up a line to start, and check in any boats that choose to race. Announcements will be made in advance of the specific dates as to the format and requirements. Any ideas for a unique format?

We look forward to a second year of duty from our RC boat, Witch Way II. Steve Coneys and his volunteers will have the boat ready for service with the promise of several additional improvements to enhance the Race Committee's bility to manage our races efficiently. We of course are in need of funds to continue with the upkeep of the RC boat. Take a moment and write a tax-deduct-

# Expectations Run High for the 2003 Youth Sailing Program

Last summer's youth sailing program was one of the best ever. A record 150 young-sters participated. They enjoyed themselves, learned a lot, and the parents were very pleased with the program. We had an outstanding group of instructors and junior instructors who worked hard, showed plenty of patience, and also knew how to have fun. Over fifty kids sailed for the first time last summer, while many returning students advanced their sailing skills, were introduced to racing, or improved their competitive racing skills.

Here's what's up for the summer ahead:

Our new head instructor will be Charlie Wardwell. Charlie is a friendly young fellow who has just graduated from Hampden-Sydney College in Virginia. Charlie brings a strong combination of teaching and racing experience to our program. In past summers he has taught sailing at clubs in Virginia and Texas, and coached racing teams as well. He has campaigned his family's J-29 and Lightning, and several years ago won the junior North American championship in the Lightning class. Charlie will be a real asset to our program.

We have purchased two self-bailing J-Y Trainers for the younger kids, and have added spinnakers and trapezes to two of the 420s to allow us to teach more advanced skills to the older students.

We have hired two instructors from Vanguard Boats to conduct a racing clinic during the week of June 23rd. This will be a combination of classroom and on-the-water training and will be part of a weeklong racing program for sailors with prior racing experience.

Once again we will take sailboats, motorboats and staff to Wolfeboro for a week to conduct beginner and intermediate classes out of Brewster Academy. The Wolfeboro program had over twenty students last summer, many of whom have already signed up again. Introducing children from other parts of the Lake to sailing is an important part of LWSA's mission. Thanks to Brewster Academy for their help.

In response to comments from a number of parents, we will be trying out, over a two-

week period, a half-day format for the younger students.

### Junior Sailing Club Plans By Ed Philpot

With real warm spring days still pretty few and far between, and ice still on the lake, I have had some trouble getting motivated to think about youth sailing. Prompted by a request for this article, I have been stirred from my slumber.

We are happy to have more of the Junior Olympic events scheduled around the northeast this coming summer. My kids went with Chris and Liz Wilson to a Junior Olympic event in Newport late last summer and they learned a lot. Most importantly, however, they had a great time and improved their sailing skills as well. This is an experience we want more kids to have. Aside from these larger events for our more experienced kids, we want to continue our relationships with Lake Sunapee YC, the UNH's Dead Fish regatta and the WYC's Commodore's Cup because these events expose all of our kids, regardless of abil-

ity, to some good fun and competitive events.

One change we want to make is to separate our Opti training from our Laser/420 training. We had previously combined all boats and levels into our Wednesday night series. Separating the Optis from the Lasers and 420s will have numerous benefits. First, it al-

lows more beginners to go out and learn about racing on an Opti-only night. Second, it allows us to focus on the Optis without having to set 2 courses and work with sailors in Optis as well as 420s and Lasers. This allows coaches and adults on the water to give a more concentrated effort for the Opti sailors, as well as to the older, more experienced sailors.

What this will require is more willing volunteers, but I hope that our more experienced racers will help out on Opti nights. Some of them should also still be racing the Optis, and so at least for our transitional sailors, this will give them an opportunity to develop their skills in bigger boats while still getting their Opti practice in.

The schedule is not yet set, but I would like to run another event on Lake Opechee like last year. This gives us good exposure and it was a lot of fun. I hope to have a meeting and finalize our plans for this summer soon.

# The Freddie Richardson Scholarship

We are pleased to announce the establishment of the Freddie Richardson Scholarship Fund.

This fund will allow the LWSA to give scholarship assistance to needy youngsters – especially those who would not otherwise have a chance to experience the pleasures and challenges of sailing.

Freddie Richardson was a local youngster whose early experience sailing Widgeons and Lightnings in the 1970's led to a full time involvement with boats and boating. As a boatbuilder he helped build four 12-Meter yachts. As a member of the America II campaign in Australia, he served as bowman and was in charge of maintenance for US-42. Later he lived in an old motor yacht on Buzzards Bay, and returned to boatbuilding at Concordia, a builder of custom yachts and racing machines. On a crisp October afternoon in 1994 he went sailing with another experienced sailor and did not return. He was 37.

At the time of his death, donations received in Freddie's memory were used to buy the Optimist Dinghy that bears his name. Dozens of youngsters sail this boat each summer, yet few of them – or their parents – know how it got its name. This s e a s o n "Freddie" is getting a c o m p l e t e overhaul, so the boat, the name

and the memory will be around for many more years.

During the last holiday season, Freddie's four brothers and sisters and his parents joined together to give the LWSA a generous gift in his memory, to be used for sailing scholarships. It is their hope and ours that this will trigger further donations to help keep this important effort, and Freddie's memory, alive for years to come.

### WYC Makes Generous Donation

Special thanks are due to the Winnipesaukee Yacht Club for a most generous gift. The WYC continues to be an outstanding partner to the LWSA. Last fall at their annual "haulout meeting," the users of the WYC's Yacht Yard facility voted to donate \$2000 from the accumulated haulout fees account to the Youth Sailing Program, to be used for the purchase of additional sailboats.

These funds have been used to purchase two JY Trainer hulls. These boats are similar to our Optimist Dinghies, but are made of plastic — much more "bulletproof" than the fiberglass Opti's — and are completely self-bailing. The smaller students will have a much easier time recovering from capsizes in these boats, with much less class disruption. After the season we will evaluate our experience with these boats and determine whether to replace some of the Opti's with additional JY Trainers. We are grateful to the WYC's continued support.

# Notice of Race GLENDALE TAVERN MEMORIAL DAY CUP

### Sunday May 25, 2003

1. Organizing Authority: LWSA

2. Rules: The race will be governed by the Racing Rules of Sailing 2001--2004, the prescriptions of US Sailing, the rules of PHRF New England for monohulls, the corresponding class rules for catamarans, and the 2003 sailing instructions as modified by this notice of race.

3. Entries: The regatta is open to any boat that qualifies under the aforementioned rules. Registration is between 0900 and 1000 on May 25, 2003 at Fay's Boatyard. Each entry must be submitted on the official form or a legible copy thereof. Entry forms may be downloaded from the LWSA website at www.lwsa.org or call 603-279-8405. The entry fee is \$25 (checks pay-able to LWSA). US Sailing members take a \$5 discount.

Early registration is encouraged. Early registrants receive an additional \$3 discount. The early registrant boat will be able to forego the hassle of attending a skipper's meeting or last minute registration and just go directly to the starting area on the day of the race. Early registration will require completing all required elements and putting them in the hands of the organizing authority no later than 10 days prior to the scheduled race date. The early registrant will be sent via e-mail or direct mail all the materials required to participate.

- 4. Course: The race will be an island race as described in the special Sailing Instructions to be supplied to all registrants. The selected course will be posted on the Race Committee boat prior to the warning signal.
- 5. The Start: This is a "reverse start" event. Boats are handicapped upon registration and issued individual "delay

times" based on the selected course length and PHRF (monohull) or Sullivan Portsmouth (catamaran) handicaps factor. After the starting signal, individual boats will start after their "delay time" has elapsed.

- 7. Awards: Prizes will be awarded to the top three finishers in monohull racing and cruising class, and catamaran.class.
  - 8. Social: A party and awards ceremony open to all participating skippers and their crew will be held at the Glendale Tayern at the Glendale town docks beginning at 1700. The overall winner of the race will be recognized as this year's recipient of the Glendale Tavern Memorial Day Cup.
