Congratulations to you sailors who were victorious at the Championship Series Regattas. For the most part this summer we've had plenty of wind and many fine competitive races. Our thanks to all the sponsors of the Regattas and the WYC for running a great Jimmy Fund Race.

As the season has progressed, it has become very apparent that we, as a club, are becoming more sophisticated in not only our sailboat racing ability, but also in our overall knowledge of sailboat racing. Last year I often said, "Let's walk before we run," concerning the overall running of all aspects of racing. Now, a year later, it's time we started running.

Recent protests and conflicts indicate we must fine tune our local racing instructions and the technical running of our races. Rules such as the two knot average speed requirement, the 15 minutes to finish behind the first boat and other regulations must be re-thought.

An exact race course measuring technique (Loran) is now installed and operational on "Witch Way," our committee boat. A radio is being installed, and we'll all be able to monitor channel 16. The committee boat and chase boat will become more familiar with flag signals, recalls (if necessary) and shortening of a course in light air. Course changes due to wind shifts will occur also.

All the mentioned items are critical to the LWYRA's continued growth. As Commodore I cannot assume a problem will work itself out. A problem in our rules and/or operations must be recognized and rectified before it is discovered during a race and hence creates a conflict.

We as a club are now "running" and not "walking." With this running has come a new set of problems. We'll work them out together, through committee work and good communications. Stay high on the course – see you at the next corner.

Youth Program Sailing Successfully

The sailing program is now in its final weeks with 55 young sailors enrolled and all four Lasers and the two Optimist Prams in the water Wednesday through Saturday mornings.

At the first class all students had to pass a swimming test which consisted of treading water for five minutes and swimming 50 yards. They then had to flip over a Laser and get it upright again. This was to eliminate any fears of capsizing. Some of the kids initially needed a little help getting the boat upright but all passed this test also. In fact some of them thought capsizing the Laser was such fun, they regularly capsize to see if they can right the boat without getting wet, or on the very hot days to cool off, much to our instructor's, Grant Rawdings, chagrin.

Each morning session begins with a short greaseboard lecture on the parts of the boat and the sail, what each part does, how to make a boat go, and the different points of sail, otherwise known as the sailing circle. This is followed by a trek down to the water where the children board the boats and sail either in Smith Cove or Saunder's Bay depending on the sailing conditions.

The youths are now involved doing short races with five minute starts and signal flags. The morning session ends after the children successfully bring each boat back to the barge (they are learning how to make good landings), and they derig each boat, take out the battens, fold the sail, and get a short wrap-up from Grant at the fire station.

Parents have been overwhelmed at the progress the kids have made in such a short time. Our staff of Grant and Jake Sherman have done an excellent job. They put in many hours to get the boats ready in the morning and ensure that everyone is having a terrific time.

In fact most of the children want to know why they can't go sailing everyday. This is certainly a tribute to all involved including our sponsors without whom this program would not exist.

Overnight Race Long But Fun



The overnight race on August 11 turned out to be a great sailing experience for the second year in a row. Pleasant winds of 3-10 knots existed all night. Mother nature was helpful by offering a couple late night rain showers and gave very few glimpses of the moon. The temperature stayed warm and the sun was shining by 8:00 am Sunday.

The start was off the southeast point of Welch Island with the first leg upwind to Diamond Island. The wind blew out of the southeast all night. From Diamond the legs were: #2 a pickett boat in Wolfeboro Bay, #3 around light buoy #70 east of Mark Island, #5 around Three Mile Island in Center Harbor, #6 around Parker Island in Alton and the finish back at Welch Island. The course length was 56.4 nautical miles.

The start was at 6:00 Saturday evening and the first boat to finish was *Holy Smoke*, the J-35, with Richard Ponn at the helm at 5:09 Sunday morning.

The last boat to finish was *Freewill*, a Pearson, skippered by Chris Rich at 1:16 Sunday afternoon. All total seventeen boats entered.




