Northeast Sailing Association-New MYRA Name

"MYRA? What's that?"

"MYRA is good for junior sailors but that's about it"

"What is MYRA supposed to do anyway?"

"It includes Vermont, New Hampshire & Nova Scotia? I thought it was the <u>Maine</u> Yacht Racing Association?"

"What's the connection to the US Sailing Association?"

These are but a few of the many questions the various sailing associations in Vermont, New Hampshire, Maine and the Canadian Maritimes are asking. As a local sailing association, we the LWSA pay our dues and belong to MYRA (Maine Yacht Racing Association), here's why.

MYRA is the governing body that oversees all aspects of sailing within our region. They in turn represent us at the NEYRC (New England Yacht Racing Council) and at the USSA (United States Sailing Association).

MYRA organizes all the Junior Ladder events for the Rolex, Sears, Bemis, Smythe and Leiter Trophy events. In addition, if there is a protest that needs to be reviewed at a higher level than the club level, it is the MYRA Appeals Board that listens to the appeal. Yearly, MYRA runs seminars for its members on various topics. This past year a seminar was held at Dartmouth Sailing Center for Junior Program Chairman. This coming year a seminar is planned for certification of Club Judges. Additionally, MYRA is very supportive of the GMORA (Greater Maine Offshore Racing Association) as well as other aspects of sailing.

Last fall, the MYRA Commodore, Dave White, put together a committee representing each of the three states, I served as the NH representative. The task put before the committee was to determine how MYRA can be more supportive to our individual clubs considering the large

Night Owl Express a Success

A Full Moon, great winds and plenty of sleep highlighted the first annual Night Owl Express. The format for this race was based on the old Overnight Race, with a much shorter course, a specific time limit and a Sunday Morning awards brunch at event sponsor Patrick's Pub and Eatery.

The 5 PM scheduled start was delayed by one hour while a line of thunderstorms, pushed a front through which brought clear skys and 10 to 15 knot northwest winds all evening. The start line was set near marker 76 southeast of Welch

Island. From there all competitors headed for Three Mile Island toward a spectacular sunset. The next mark was Parker Island. A great downwind run with gusts to 18 knots and just enough waves to provide an occasional extra push.

The two divisions separated at this point with Cruising Class boats proceeding west to Diamond Island, then east of Welch Island, then a finish by Marker 26 near Belknap Point. Racing Class boats sailed a little further. After Parker Island they tacked for Welch Island round-








Out of these meetings, the representatives from VT and NH expressed great concern about belonging to an association which did not denote the entire region. As an answer to that, at the annual meeting in Camden, the board approved the name change of MYRA to NSA (Northeast Sailing Association).

In addition to the name change, VT and NH requested that a region be established comprising VT and NH which would be known as the Western Division. This was also approved. The Western Division will join the other three standing divisions, Eastern (Downeast Maine), Central (Central Maine), and Southern (Southern Maine). These divisions are critical to the Rolex Ladder Events, as each region must hold individual competitions prior to sending the kids on to the Area Championships which is followed by the National Championships

The clubs located in VT and NH will be organizing over the winter to set up regional committees to address Junior Events, One Design, Senior Events, Offshore/Onshore Events, Race Management, etc. Each of these committees will then send a regional representative to the NSA Board Meetings. It is hoped that by centralizing the controls, more attention can be given to the unique problems each region experiences.

As these sub-committees are organized and directions are decided, you will be hearing more about NSA and what it does for the clubs within its area.
