The Kanegsberg's took their J/27 Time Bandit on the road in late August and September with the regular crew members (Denise Hammond, Susan Sparks, Helaine Kanegsberg, Phil Kanegsberg, and Alan Kanegsberg) augmented on separate

occasions by Linda Mackey, Howie Kanegsberg, Bob Knowles, and Bob Lemaire.

The August trip was the weekend of August 23 - 25 to the PHRF New England Championship in Marblehead, MA. The Race Committee set windward-leeward courses of about 6 miles in length. The courses were located about 7 miles offshore from Marblehead.

TB raced as the slowest boat in a

fleet of 12 with ratings from 110 to 126. Seven J/29's, two J/80's, a J/34, and a Hinkley 42.

The racing was close and TB got the gun at the finish for the first race. That shook the competition up (who are those guys?) and did not happen again. The J/29's are tough competition, especially when they are sailed well. TB finished third after a hot J/29 and a Hinkley 42.

In the entire event there were over 125 boats with more than 1,000 crew members. Despite the crowd, TB did see Alan Blair, Carter White, Richard Hallett, and Ken Browne. Boats came from as far away as Portland, ME and Newport, RI.

Club, and Corinthian Yacht Club. The facilities and race committees were fantastic. It is worth the trip even if you just go on someone else's boat.

On September 23, TB travelled to Rye, NY for the American Yacht Club/New York Yacht Club Fall Series on Long Island Sound. Over 120 boats competed over two weekends for various trophies.

There were 10 J/44's racing for their North American Championships along with IMS 40' to 50' boats, PHRF Fleets, 4 Melges 24's, and 7 J/27's competing for the Northeast Championship. All fleets were on the same course (9 starts!).

It is daunting calling buoy room on a 45' Nelson Marek and frustrating when 5 J/44's under spinnakers blanket you. All races were windward-leeward, multiple legs (about 8 miles).

The first day dawned very windy and sunny. The wind for the 10:00 AM race started at 20 knots and built

all day. By the middle of the second race, it blew a steady 30 with gusts as high as 38. Long Island Sound is very shallow (50 - 60 feet) so the waves were very big and very steep.

Survival sailing even for the big boats. Two 40+' boats were dismasted, one third of the fleet retired, and several boats sported new spinnaker battle flags.

TB only broached to windward once (first and only spinnaker set) and Alan decided to check the rudder after a tack, head first!! TB survived with 2 thirds, once doing 13.5 knots downwind with just a main and jib.

Sunday was cloudy with 8 to 10 knot variable winds, just like the lake but with current added. It was strange to see a starting line square to the wind with the committee boat stern pointing at the pin.

The crew of TB did everything right and stayed in phase with the shifts for the whole two hour race and won by over 11 minutes. The second race that day was cancelled because the wind died.

TB's crew hauled the boat out of the water and everyone went home for a week with TB tied for second.

The second Saturday dawned clear and cold with 10 to 12 knot winds. TB took two more firsts. TB held first place with five races complete. There would be a throwout and only one race on Sunday. TB had to sail defensively to prevent the second place boat from getting a boat between us.

In spite of light winds and big boat blankets, TB got a second and won the J/27 Northeast Championship 0.25 point. The Flag Officers of the two clubs presented the awards in full uniforms.
